This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

The music curriculum at Warren Park Primary School follows the Hampshire Music Service musical maps, which are aligned with the national curriculum. Each academic year is divided into three music units, with one unit taught each term. Students engage in practical exploration of music, ensuring coverage of all musical dimensions, with a particular emphasis on pitch and duration. These elements are foundational for broader musical knowledge.

Year 4 students have participated in the Leigh Park Music Project, gaining additional exposure to music through sessions conducted by Hampshire Music Service staff, including experiences with music technology. Additionally, Hampshire Music Service provides the Listen2Me program to Year 3 and/or Year 4 students, offering weekly music sessions.

Music is taught either during a half afternoon once a week or through a longer session every other week. SEN students with cognition and learning needs benefit from the curriculum's emphasis on practical activities, which reduces the cognitive load associated with writing. SEN students with sensory needs receive appropriate support, such as the use of ear defenders and other tailored techniques.

As part of their music curriculum, Year 6 students have the opportunity to lead the summer production, allowing them to develop leadership skills and apply their musical knowledge in a practical context. Overall, the music curriculum at Warren Park Primary School is designed to provide comprehensive musical education through practical exploration, specialized programs, and tailored support for SEN students, while fostering leadership and performance skills in older students.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Warren Park School offers a variety of co-curricular music opportunities, although it remains an area for development due to financial constraints and limited space within the school building for additional lessons. Key Stage 2 children have the chance to audition for the school choir, which boasts up to 60 members and performs in at least two concerts each year. Choir rehearsals take place every Tuesday lunchtime.

The school also provides a Ukulele Club as an after-school activity, run by Hampshire Music Service, which, at the height of its popularity, had an attendance of 24. Additionally, four students were selected as Vocal Ambassadors and participated in workshops conducted by Hampshire Music Service. These ambassadors displayed great enthusiasm and had the opportunity to perform in Basingstoke at a theatre alongside thousands of other singers.

Despite these offerings, there is a recognised need to further develop the co-curricular music program. Efforts are being made to shift the culture within the school and the local community to better support and expand musical opportunities. Exploring various options to enhance the program is a current focus for the school.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

At Warren Park Primary School, students enjoy a range of musical experiences that foster a love for music and singing. Every Wednesday, there is a singing assembly led by the music leader, alternating between Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2. These assemblies expose children to a variety of musical genres, encouraging them to listen, discuss, and develop a passion for singing. Vocal ambassadors play a significant role in these assemblies by sharing warm-ups and musical games with KS1 children.

Key Stage 2 students participate in a Christmas production, with Year 5 taking the lead, incorporating numerous singing performances. Year 6 also lead a summer production as previously mentioned in an earlier box. The school choir, consisting of up to 60 members, rehearses every Tuesday lunchtime and performs in at least two concerts each year. In addition to school events, Year 4 students are excited to perform at the local secondary school in July, joining others from the Leigh Park area.

Although Hampshire Music Service and other companies have previously visited the school for assemblies, these visits have been limited since the COVID-19 pandemic. Before the pandemic, the choir was actively involved in community outreach, performing at old people's homes and Christmas light switch-on events. The school aims to revive these community engagements as part of its development goals.

Overall, while Warren Park Primary School offers enriching musical experiences, there is a focus on enhancing and expanding these opportunities, particularly in community outreach and external collaborations, to return to pre-pandemic levels of activity.

In the future
